PALM SUNDAY OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7

Isaiah describes the pain and insults of the Servant of God. Yet he sounds hopeful when describing God as his help, knowing he will not be disgraced.

SECOND READING: PHILIPPIANS 2:6-11

Paul exults Christ's great sacrifice of humbling himself to become human and die on the cross. He explains that this is why we should now realize the importance of honoring both his name and memory.

GOSPEL: MARK 14:1-15:47

Mark describes the events leading up to Christ's crucifixion. The Last Supper is described, explaining where the Eucharist began. Judas betrays Jesus and his suffering at the hands of the Sanhedrin (Council) is detailed.

CELEBRATING THE SACRAMENTS

CONFIRMATION: "Through the sacrament of confirmation, the baptized are more perfectly bound to the church and are enriched with a special strength of the Holy Spirit." Confirmation is offered to adults through the RCIA process, and annually for our eighth-grade students. As with the other sacraments of initiation, preparation is involved.

MATRIMONY: Couples should contact the parish office as soon as possible or at least six months in advance of the desired wedding date to make arrangements for preparation.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS: For those who are interested in finding out more information about the Catholic faith and/or interested in becoming Catholic. Please call the parish office.

We celebrate Palm Sunday of the Passion of our Lord this coming weekend. Palms will be available at the end of Mass. This is one of the most heavily attended weekends for Mass. We recall Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the dramatic turn of events as we read the account of the Lord's Passion and Death in the Gospel of Mark. What was the motivation for Jesus to endure such pain and degradation for us? Why would a human being go through such torture? For Jesus, it was obedience to the Father and love for all humanity. He was willing to give all he had for all who lived or would live. Have you ever considered that this was done for you as an individual and not just as part of a group? This is God's genuine self-sacrifice for each and for all. This great gift is re-presented at every Mass celebrated. As bread and wine are consecrated separately, we enter into His death and as we receive His Body and Blood in Holy Communion, we join in the Resurrection of Jesus. "What wondrous Love is this", is a marvelous expression of this truth. SAINT OF THE WEEK



SAINT BERTHOLD

Feast Day - March 29

Died circa 1195

Not much is known about this hermit who is considered by some historians to be the founder of the order of Carmelite friars. Various legends had him born in Limoges, France, educated at the University of Paris, and participating in the Crusades in Turkey. What is known is that he directed a group of Frankish hermits living on Mount Carmel in Palestine in the second half of the 12th century. The existence on Mount Carmel of a church and hermitage in the spiritual tradition of the prophet Elijah is documented from 1163 on. After Berthold's death, the hermits were led by another Frenchman, St. Brocard; Carmelite houses became well-established throughout Europe by 1300.

· INGREDIENTS ·

EASTER BREAD (6 single servings)

1 cup milk (scalded) 1/3 cup butter (melted in milk)

small bowl

*

1/4 cup warm water 1 package yeast 1 tsp. sugar

small bowl

2 eggs beaten 1/2 cup sugar pinch salt

small bowl

Let all ingredients sit about 15 minutes, add to flour - mix well

3 3/4 cups flour

large bowl



Knead on floured surface, 10 minutes (add more flour if needed). Rub dough ball with vegetable oil & place in oiled bowl. Cover and put in warm place to rise, 1 hour or double in size. Punch dough and cut into 6 equal parts (do not flour surface). Roll each piece into a strip about 15-18" long, place raw, colored egg* in center, bring ends together and twist. Place on flat baking tray. Brush with egg white and dust with colored sprinkles or sugar. Cover and let rise, bake at 350° 20-25 minutes until golden brown.

*Colored eggs - use food coloring dye to color 6 raw in-the-shell eggs. 1 cup warm water, 1 tbsp. white vinegar, 5-6 drops food color. Egg will cook while bread bakes.

Tell DDOT about your transportation priorities! Shape the next DDOT plan and how money is spent!

Your input to the DDOT long-range transportation plan **MoveDC** is important! The District Department of Transportation planners need to hear from many of our city's more than 112,000 older adults / seniors.

Faster sidewalk repair? Crossing the street more easily in all parts of the city? Reduce speeding on our streets? Changes so buses can move faster? Improve the condition of bus stops? More transportation options in "transportation deserts" like Wards 7 and 8? What does transportation equity mean to you? What are your priorities to improve multimodal transportation in DC?

Hey, what is *multimodal* transportation?! It's just the many ways there are to get around...walking, taking the bus/train, using a wheelchair, taxi/Uber/Lyft, biking or driving. Tell DDOT which of these transportation modes, the many mobility options for going places, are most important to you, as a senior.

Communicate your thoughts, priorities and concerns in three ways:

 Be sure to include your age. Add comments by clicking the white bubbles.
- <u>Call the Hotline</u> at **(202) 599-7371** any Thursday (10am-11am) in February or March to talk to a DDOT staff member. <u>Or</u> call any time of day and leave a message with your name and phone number, and your call will be returned. <u>You may take a survey by calling the Hotline</u>. Ask that your age be recorded. (Yes, optional, but this is a way for seniors to be counted.)
- Send an email to movedc@dc.gov. Include your age; make seniors count.
