THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Wisdom 11:22-12:2

In this reading, we are reminded of the love God feels toward every creature, or else he would not have created them. God shows mercy on our sins and hopes we will repent and have faith in him.

Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 1:11-2:2

Paul tells the Thessalonians that God will make them worthy of his call, so that they can be glorified in Christ. Paul also tells them he is unsure when Christ will come again, but urges them not to believe people who falsely state that Jesus has returned.

GOSPEL: LUKE 19:1-10

Zacchaeus, the wealthy chief tax collector in Jericho, was very excited when Jesus came to town and asked to stay with him. People were angry that Jesus would go to a sinner's home. Zacchaeus then told Jesus he planned to give half of his belongings to the poor, and repay any person he had cheated. Jesus was delighted since his mission was "to search out and save what was lost."

CELEBRATING THE SACRAMENTS

BAPTISM: The sacrament joyfully celebrates the entrance of members into our Catholic community. Baptisms are celebrated on Saturday mornings at 9:45am or by appointment, following preparation of the parents. Baptisms for adults take place through the RCIA process.

CONFIRMATION: "Through the sacrament of confirmation, the baptized are more perfectly bound to the church and are enriched with a special strength of the Holy Spirit." Confirmation is offered to adults through the RCIA process, and annually for our eighth-grade students. As with the other sacraments of initiation, preparation is involved.

MATRIMONY: Couples should contact the parish office as soon as possible or at least six months in advance of the desired wedding date to make arrangements for preparation.

RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS: For those who are interested in finding out more information about the Catholic faith and/or interested in becoming Catholic. Please call the parish office.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Our parish continues Christ's ministry of making whole the members of our community who suffer physical or emotional ills with Anointing of the Sick. Please call the parish office if you would like to receive this sacrament.



PASTOR'S CORNER



Dear Parishioners and Friends,

We have now completed our October Count for 2022. Since we sometimes have five weeks in October and sometimes four, we only count the first four weeks so we may have a consistent formula to calculate the average. As you can see, we actually had a slight decrease in the average number of people attending Mass in 2022 than we did in 2021 during the COVID 19 pandemic. In research, this trend has happened across all religious denominations. Presently, between 20% to 30% of those who profess the Catholic faith attend Mass regularly. That is at least once a month. Many people over 65 have not returned to regular attendance. I invite you to join your sisters and brothers in gathering to receive the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ.

Tuesday, November 1, All Saints Day is a Holy Day of Obligation where we are obliged to come to Church for Mass. We will have a Vigil Mass on October 31 at 6:30 PM and Masses on Tuesday at 8 AM, 10:30 AM (School Mass), to which you are invited, and 6 PM. On November 2, All Souls Day, Masses are at 8 AM and 5:30 PM followed by Adoration of the Most Blessed Sacrament and Confession from 6 PM to 7 PM. Throughout the month of November, Masses will be offered for All Souls.

ZECHARIAH AND ELIZABETH

first century

FEAST NOVEMBER 5

The first chapter of Luke's Gospel tells the story of John the Baptist's parents. Elizabeth, a cousin of Mary, is old and childless; her husband, Zechariah, is a priest in Jerusalem. Zechariah is praying in the Temple when an angel reveals Elizabeth will bear a son named John. When he doesn't believe the angel, he is struck dumb until he confirms the name John at his son's circumcision. Before John's birth, Mary, who is pregnant with Jesus, visits Elizabeth; their prayerful greetings became the "Hail Mary" and "Canticle of Mary." Luke also credits Zechariah with a canticle of praise. Elizabeth is the patron saint of pregnant women and infertile couples.

ALL SAINTS DAY

HOLY DAY OF OBLIGATION

November 1st is All Saints Day. The Apostles' Creed lists "the communion of saints" among Catholic beliefs, and since at least the ninth century the church has honored everyone in heaven, including angels, formally recognized martyrs and saints, and all those who had died in God's friendship, with a November feast. As early as 411, the Eastern church celebrated a feast of all martyrs in May. The custom gradually spread to other regions and included nonmartyrs. In England the feast formerly was known as All Hallows, that is, made holy, which gave rise to Halloween.

Monday, October 31 Vigil Mass will be at 6:30pm

Tuesday, November 1 Feast Day Masses are at 8:00am, 10:30am (School Mass) and 6:30pm.

ALL Souls Day

November 2nd is All Souls Day and commemorates the faithful departed. As Catholics we are called to pray for those who have gone before us that they may attain the beatific vision of God in heaven. They may be helped by our prayers and by the sacrifice of the Mass.



At Annunciation, the prayer for Souls carries on throughout the month of November. If you would like to include someone, please complete the envelope as pictured which will be placed by the Tabernacle. A Book of Names of the Dead will also be placed near the Sanctuary for you to enter names. Envelopes may be found in the back of Church.




Saint Charles Borromeo: The Good Shepherd
