SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

FIRST READING: ISAIAH 11:1-10

In this beautiful passage, a messianic prophecy, Isaiah exults in the coming of the Lord, who will bring justice and peace for all.

SECOND READING: ROMANS 15:4-9

Paul reveals to us the necessity of living in peace and harmony. His words "Accept one another, then, as Christ accepted you, for the Glory of God" are as needed today as they were in Paul's own time.

Gospel: Matthew 3:1-12

John the Baptizer prepares the way for Jesus. Clothed in a garment of camel's hair, he baptizes the people in the Jordan River, but warns the Pharisees in ringing tones that they must give evidence that they mean to reform.

Confirmation is offered to adults through the RCIA process, and annually for our eighth-grade students. As with the other sacraments of initiation, preparation is involved.

MATRIMONY: Couples should contact the parish office as soon as possible or at least six months in advance of the desired wedding date to make arrangements for preparation.

Pastor's Corner

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

How do we read the Sacred Scriptures? Do we read them with a historical mindset, from a faith perspective, as a narrative or with a critical viewpoint? Probably we use each of these and maybe others as well. One thing is very clear in our Gospel for the 2nd Sunday of Advent, Matthew 3:1-12; there is a distinction of importance between John the Baptist and Jesus. We read in the Acts of the Apostles 18:24-28 and 19:1-7 that John's message lasted after his



death and that of Jesus' as well. That John was a historical figure of importance is well documented and many people sought him out, including Jesus. Matthew's gospel enables us to see the superior role that Jesus would have in salvation history. John would be the last of the Hebrew Scripture Prophets and the first of the first of the New Testament.

What impact does this have in our lives? We may ask ourselves has our faith in Jesus increased as we have matured. Have we internalized in our hearts the message that Jesus has come for the salvation of all people? Do we actively build up the Kingdom of God through our words and actions? How has our baptism, "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit", transformed us into the one body of Christ? The baptism of John and Jesus gives us a great opportunity to reflect on our baptism and how great a gift we have received.

This weekend the Little Sisters of the Poor will be at the doors of our church seeking your generosity in caring for the elderly poor whom they serve.

December 8th is a Holy Day of Obligation, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. We will have a Vigil Mass on Wednesday, December 7th at 5:30 PM and Masses on December 8th at 8 AM, 10:30 AM (School Mass — all are welcome) and 6:30 PM.



SAINT OF THE WEEK



Nicholas

Fourth Century

FEAST DECEMBER 6

From the ninth century in the East and the 11th century in the West, Nicholas has been one of the most popular saints in Christendom and art, and the patron of many countries, dioceses, churches and cities. He was bishop of Myra in Lycia (now Turkey). According to folklore, he saved three girls from prostitution, restored to life three murdered children hidden in a brine-tub or saved from death three unjustly condemned men. There is no evidence that he attended the Council of Nicaea in 325 or suffered persecution for his faith. "Santa Claus" comes from the Dutch form of his name: "Sinte Klaas."

The Catholic dogma that Mary, the mother of Jesus, was free from original sin from the moment of her conception and preserved from all sin throughout her earthly life was declared by Pope Pius IX in 1854. However, for centuries Catholics had believed in Mary's exceptional holiness as a divine favor in anticipation of her role in salvation; by the eighth century, the Eastern church believed her holiness was flawless and immense, and this belief gradually spread throughout the Western church. The feast is fixed nine months before the feast marking Mary's birthday on Sept. 8. Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception is the patron of the United States and 10 other nations in South America, Africa, Asia and Europe.



The Archdiocese of Washington invites you to the annual *Walk with Mary* procession and Mass to honor Our Lady of Guadalupe, Patroness of the Americas, on Saturday, December 10, 2022. The procession will depart from the Shrine of the Sacred Heart (16th St. & Park Rd., NW) at 11:00 a.m. and conclude at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception (4th St. & Michigan Ave., NE). The praying of the Rosary will be at 1:00 p.m., followed by the Mass at 2:00 p.m., with Cardinal Wilton D. Gregory, Archbishop of Washington as the principal celebrant, and Auxiliary Bishop Mario E. Dorsonville, as the homilist.
